

A Princess, A Volcano, and A Little Kindness

Author Beth Greenway releases new picture book featuring Hawaiian history.

In 1881 Princess Luka visited Hilo, Hawai'i to save the town from Mauna Loa's looming lava flow. Beth Greenway's new picture book A True Princess of Hawai'i blends this historical event into a story of how kindness and generosity are an important part of being a princess.

The book opens on the morning of Princess Luka's arrival to the small town, where she will appeal to the goddess Pele to stop the lava. Nani dresses in her finest clothes and heads out to join her friend Keoki at the pier to greet the princess. Along the way Nani

shares her candy with an old woman, helps the princess by feeding her carriage horse, and gives a piece of her petticoat to the princess. After Princess Luka has saved the town, she reflects on the day and learns that being a princess is not about fancy clothes, it is about helping others.

Author Beth Greenway began writing stories when she lived in the Hawaiian Islands. The rich culture inspired her to write this story about Princess Luka, who cared deeply for the islands. Illustrator Tammy Yee's rich watercolors complement the story and bring out the brilliance of the islands. Growing up in Hawaii, Tammy once lived above Hilo on the spot where the lava once ran.

After the story, young readers are able to learn more about the science and history introduced in the story. A "For Creative Minds" section includes activities that introduce the science behind a volcanic eruption, and a profile of Princess Luka.
